Clergy Corner:

Annual Parish Meeting Edition, Rector's Report to the Congregation

As we prepare for our Annual Parish Meeting November 2, there is much to remember and much to give thanks for as 2008 draws to a close. Since our retreat in January, your Vestry has worked diligently to improve both our facilities and our fiscal viability. One has only to look to see these improvements: our beautiful new stone masonry sign fronting Academy Street; our newly paved parking lot which we share with the Good Samaritan Clinic; new replacement windows for the 1960 office/nursery wing (currently being installed); and improved grounds keeping thanks to Story Rice, Karen Hall and many others. Also, Mary Haynes and her cleaning crew continue to do an amazing job in keeping the interior of our buildings in beautiful condition. Please take time to thank these faithful folks and to thank God for their many labors of love. All of these projects have been accomplished through gifts above and beyond the general fund commitments of our parishioners and to date no general operating fund monies have been expended to complete these works. Also, take time to thank God for our Diocese and our Bishop from whom we have just received \$25,000 in grant monies and \$8,600 in no-interest loan monies for the completion of our parking lot project. If you ever wonder what your diocese does for our parish, please consider this: since 1990 St. Andrew's has received some \$135,000 in grant monies from the Episcopal Foundation of Western North Carolina for "bricks and mortar" projects, together with some \$58,600 in no-interest loans from the "Restoration Fund" of the diocese. Likewise, we have received over \$10,000 in diocesan "Mission and Society Grants" matching funds for outreach ministry, plus an additional \$15,000 in "Human Hurt and Hope Fund" grants for the start-up of the Good Samaritan Clinic.

Our annual contribution to the mission and ministry of the Diocese of Western North Carolina is an outward and visible sign of our gratitude for our

partnership in ministry with our Bishop and diocesan family from whom we have received so much. Your Vestry is on record to increase our giving to the diocese until we return to the 10% level that we once enjoyed, and which is the minimum pledge percentage asked of each parish. Currently, our pledge for 2008 is at 4.8% of our 2006 budgeted income, or \$7,500. In 2009, we are committed to increasing to 5.8% of our 2007 income, or \$10,000. Our plan is to increase 1% per year until we regain the tithe. Bishop Taylor has told us that our diocese would have an additional \$400,000 of ministry and program income if all of our parishes were at the 10% minimum level. The average parochial pledge in our diocese is 8.3% which is about ½ of the Province IV (Southeastern US dioceses) average of 16%.

Continuing on the fiscal ministry front, your Vestry has in 2008 transferred our mortgage obligations to Mennonite Mutual Aid Association from RBC Centura Bank. This move has resulted in smaller monthly payments and much better terms overall. It is absolutely amazing to realize that the principal amount of our mortgage has decreased from \$300,000 to \$181,000 in just four years time. Again, this remarkable feat is entirely due to the herculean efforts of you, the people of God at St. Andrew's. Through our Holy Smoke Ministry Team begun by Dean Hines and currently headed by Nancy and Terry Rice, and through the sacrificial giving of time, talent and treasure by so many of you this mortgage has become entirely manageable and is no longer something to be feared. We have so much to be thankful for as God's people in this parish.

Having said that, we still have some distance to go to balance the General Operating Fund budget of St. Andrew's. Your Vestry is hard at work to find ways to reduce expenditures in every area where it is faithful and reasonable to do so. At the October meeting, the Vestry appointed an ad hoc budget committee of the Rector, the Sr. and Jr. Wardens, the Treasurer and vestry members Richard Lance and Terry Rose to take a hard look at the expense side of

the budget with the goal of trimming where it is reasonably possible to trim. At this point, we literally have no idea of what the income side of the budget will look like. We have to date received very few commitments for 2009 as we prepare for the Annual Meeting November 2. What we do know is that our parish budget is entirely dependent upon the generosity and stewardship response of the total membership of St. Andrew's. As your priest and pastor, I think it is important for you to know that I would never ask you to do something that I am not willing to do, especially in the area of Stewardship. Our family commits a tithe of our income to God through St. Andrew's each year as we have done since I was called to serve as your rector. Likewise, any member who agrees to be nominated for Vestry service signs a Vestry Covenant, one provision of which is to tithe or to work toward the 10% level of giving as a goal while serving as an elected leader of the parish. I want you to know that your ordained and elected leadership team is totally committed to the fiscal health and viability of our beloved parish.

I also want you to know that your leadership team is fully cognizant of the financial and economic realities that we are all facing. Times are tough, and we don't know how long the current crisis will last. What I do know is that this parish walks by faith and not by sight. We literally live hand to mouth and Sunday to Sunday in our financial life. We have no endowment, we have no cash reserves, we have no stock portfolio. What we do have in abundance is a tremendously generous core group of committed parishioners—yourselves. Most importantly, we have the sure provision of a gracious and generous Father in Heaven who has never failed to supply all of our needs and more from His storehouse of blessings. God indeed has a track record at St. Andrew's, and we can continue to have faith in what God will do in the future.

We are all very aware that the economic landscape of the nation and world is changing and that we will have to adjust spending priorities and stewardship goals in order to engage faithfully the emerging realities of a new era. By the time that we gather for our Annual Meeting the Budget Committee will have presented its recommendations to the Vestry who will vote on the proposed budget to be presented to you on All Saints Sunday, November 2. You may expect to see a spending plan which is much leaner, much more realistic, and

which mandates that we live within our means as a parish family.

What this will mean in a practical sense is that we will all be called upon to support our common life in more creative and more faithful ways. You may be asked to donate office or kitchen supplies. Our youth may need to do more fund raisers to support their program activities. More of the communion visits to the sick or homebound may be made by Lay Eucharistic Visitors to save on clergy travel expenses (the IRS mileage reimbursement rate is now \$0.585 per mile). You may be asked to volunteer time in the office for receptionist and light clerical work. All the baptized will be asked to join together in the total mission, ministry, and program of St. Andrew's. At the end of the day this is not a bad thing; indeed it is a more faithful New Testament model of being church, a model which empowers and equips the laity to do what we were all baptized to do.

As that great theologian, Bob Dylan, once sang, "*The times, they are a'changing...*" This has never been more true than it is now, and we must have the faith, the courage, and the flexibility to change with them. What we need to remember most of all is what the angel told Mary: "*Be Not Afraid!*" For all of the changes and chances of the unseen future we are still God's beloved people and these are very exciting times to be a faithful community of committed Christians in the world. I can't tell you what a joy it is to continue to serve Christ as your priest and pastor in these amazing, changing times.

- The fire extinguishers have been checked, recharged, or replaced.
- Windows with storms and screens were donated for Fr. Tim's office, the Parish Administrator's office, and the nursery.
- The chairs in the foyer were re-upholstered with the help of a donation.
- It became necessary to replace the old St. Andrew's sign. A memorial donation was given for the new sign, restoration of the St. Andrew's cross, and the stone work to create a new sign in keeping with the design of the church. All of the new stone came from the Pigeon River.

- A donated stained glass light was hung in the vestibule and the other stained glass light was hung in the sacristy.

I'm always at a loss when asked to tell about myself; my initial thought is "I'm just me, nothing special or out of the ordinary; just me". So when I was asked to write this article about myself for the newsletter, I didn't quite know how to begin or what to say, so I guess I'll just start at the beginning and go from there.

I was raised as a typical Southern Baptist – consequently as soon as I was old enough to make my own decisions I spent a good few many years away from “organized” religion. I did however,

retain a very strong spirituality and faith in God; and for a while it was enough for me just to have that even though I wasn't part of a church or a worshipful community. However, when my son Bailey was born and started to grow up and ask questions, I began to think – how can I instill in him the faith that I have? I was pretty sure I couldn't do it by myself so I started with visiting a large Baptist church that a colleague of mine at the time attended, which will remain nameless in the spirit of goodwill and tolerance. She always exuded an air of calmness and well-being which she attributed to her faith. I figured if her church could help her that much, maybe Bailey and I could benefit from going there too. So I went, and enjoyed the huge movie screens and modern music, but I was a little bothered by the fact that no-one introduced themselves or even inquired as to who I was, much less asked Bailey who or how he was and would he like to come to Sunday School? So after two visits I decided that environment wasn't for us. Then, fortunately, another co-worker asked me to visit St. Andrews. The only time I had ever even set foot in an Episcopal church was to play a trumpet solo at Christmas time when I was in High School (a long, long time ago). At any rate, I was a little intimidated because I had never experienced a prayer book or had a need for kneelers or instructions for the service. I spent my first service at St. Andrews juggling the prayer book and the hymnal and trying to figure out where I needed to be in which and hoping that I didn't drop one or the other. But what I remember most is that Carole Talman came up to me and started a conversation, and Eleanor Hazell invited me to Nimble Fingers and offered to teach me how to knit; something I have always wanted to know how to do. I brought Bailey with me the next Sunday and when he saw Father Tim, he just started smiling and I knew I was in the right place. I have never in my life felt so welcomed and I thank God everyday that He led me to St. Andrews.

So now I'm an old hand at Holy Smoke and teach Sunday School for the elementary children and even clean the undercroft every second Friday. I can't effectively put into words how much St. Andrews means to me, but for what it's worth, I never imagined that I would find a place or a people that would incite me to get out of bed, voluntarily no less, before ten o'clock every Sunday morning; much less seek out a position that would require “extracurricular” attendance. To put it in a nutshell, I

love all of you, unconditionally, unceasingly and I am here for you for whatever you need me for. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart, for having me as a part of your family.

We still have 2 Credos, Thanksgiving and Christmas Orders.

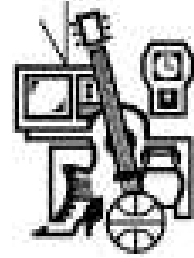
Thank you to all of our tireless volunteer. Without you Holy Smoke's Ministry would not be possible.
